Our background	<p>CESL has been training students, scholars, teachers, and businesspeople since 1968; we have changed with the times, offering state-of-the-art computer and media labs, and a curriculum of classroom practice based on the latest pedagogical research. What has NOT changed is our commitment to meeting the needs of our students, our cultural sensitivity, and the high academic standards which we promote in our Center. Because we see language learning as a process accomplished both inside and outside the classroom, we offer students help in settling in, cultural orientation, and many opportunities to interact with the local community. In the classroom and computer lab, we offer intensive specialized training in English pronunciation, conversation, grammar, and academic reading and writing.</p>

Tucson, Arizona	We are located in Tucson, Arizona, a beautiful mid-sized city in the heart of the Southwestern U.S., just hours from Mexico, Las Vegas, and the beaches of southern California.
Conditional Admission	Students should first apply to the U of Arizona (www.arizona.edu). Undergraduate Admission grants conditional admission to eligible students who complete the Undergraduate application process and recognized the CESL endorsement in place of the required TOEFL score. http://www.cesl.arizona.edu/endorsement.htm Not all graduate departments grant conditional admission or recognize the CESL endorsement. Students must complete department applications as well as graduate College applications.

Tuition & Fees	Costs are calculated on a per month basis for tuition and fees. To estimate a student's total costs, calculate: \$1070 Tuition + \$340 Fees x Number of months. Add \$1200 a month for housing, food and personal expenses. http://www.cesl.arizona.edu/cost.htm
